Military Uniform Guidelines

1. Uniform

a. The only items that are allowed on our forage cap are:

- A brass letter "F"
- A brass number "14"
- A light blue or white wool trefoil

b. The only items allowed to be worn on our sack coat are:

- A brass trefoil
- A silver trefoil
- A light blue or white wool trefoil.

c. The uniform should be kept clean, any holes should be mended or covered with similar material.

d. Brass should be polished once per quarter

e. Leather, especially shoes, should be blackened once per quarter.

f. The rifle musket should be cleaned after each event and free of rust.

g. The bayonet should be free of rust.

2. Each soldier should have 30 cartridges and 45 caps for each event.

3. Every soldier is expected to fire at each event.

4. If a soldier is unable to fire, he will be expected to stand guard or help the company cook.

5. Pipes and cigars are the only items that are allowed for smoking, no cigarettes.
Tobacco may be chewed.

6. Keep any 21st century items out of public view.

7. The only items allowed to be sat on, in camp, besides a blanket, are wooden cartridge boxes or cracker boxes. Any other items must be approved by the authenticity officer or his designee.

8. Officers will always be saluted. Do not salute noncommissioned officers.
